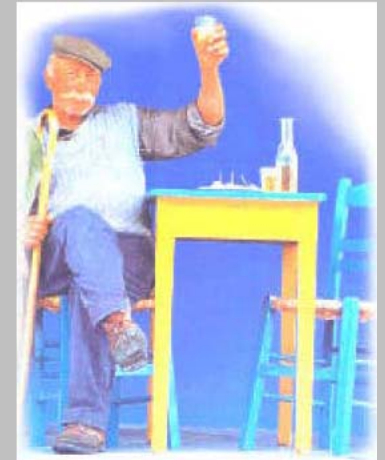

In The Beginning...

From the beginning of the last century, Greek immigrants started to settle in Norwalk, Connecticut to seek their American dreams. In 1940, they purchased a small Lutheran Church at 8 Fort Point Street in East Norwalk. Mr. George Zapherson, the highest sponsor, was given the honor of naming the church, which he named after his patron saint, Saint George the Great Martyr.

In 1953, the Archbishop Michael, then primate of the Greek Orthodox Church in America, granted to the Saint George parish the ecclesiastical charter and appointed its first priest, Fr. George Panagoulas.

As years passed, the community grew and with it so did the concern that the small church could no longer serve their growing needs.

In 1972, a young priest, Fr. Germanos Stavropoulos, was assigned as the Pastor of Saint George's parish. Fr. Germanos was a man with a great vision, he was full of energy and passion for his job. He realized that the community needed a new church and a community center and began working toward that dream.

Years earlier, his predecessors had the foresight to purchase property on West Rocks Road. It was here that the dream of a new home for his flock would be realized.
